Joseph Conrad (1857-1924)


- Born Józef Teodor Konrad Korzeniowski in the Ukraine.
- Parents were political activists who died when Conrad was a child.
- 1874: Joins the Merchant Marines.
- 1878: Joins the British Merchant Marines. Speaks no English.
- 1890: In the Congo Free State for the Société pour le Commerce du Haut-Congo as second in command and, temporarily, captain of the river steamer *Roi des Belges*.
- Heart of Darkness (serialized 1899)
- *Lord Jim* (serialized 1899-1900)
- Nostromo (serialized and published in book form 1903)







The Gothic and *Heart of Darkness*

What vain weathercocks we are! I, who had determined to hold myself independent of all social intercourse, and thanked my stars that, at length, I had lighted on a spot where it was next to impracticable—I, weak wretch, after maintaining till dusk a struggle with low spirits and solitude, was finally compelled to strike my colours; and under pretence of gaining information concerning the necessities of my establishment, I desired Mrs. Dean, when she brought in supper, to sit down while I ate it; hoping sincerely she would prove a regular gossip, and either rouse me to animation or lull me to sleep by her talk.....The worthy woman bustled off, and I crouched nearer the fire; my head felt hot, and the rest of me chill: moreover, I was excited, almost to a pitch of foolishness, through my nerves and brain. This caused me to feel, not uncomfortable, but rather fearful (as I am still) of serious effects from the incidents of today and yesterday. She returned presently, bringing a smoking basin and a basket of work; and, having placed the former on the hob, drew in her seat, evidently pleased to find me so companionable.
